Where to stay

In my wild youth, I camped here and, indeed, the Beachside Holiday Park, at the very foot of the Mount with the beach on one side, the harbour on the other and the saltwater hot pools in between, has to be one of the best spots in the country. On my last visit, though, I stayed across the road in an extremely family-friendly two-bedroom apartment at The Pacific that had views of all of the above, plus two bathrooms, a full kitchen, laundry, TV and use of the swimming pool. Throw in a two-minute walk to the beach (and good coffee at Sidetrack) and as much as I like a tent, I'm sold.

2 What to do
The Mount beach is a stunner, famous for its golden sand and surf. You could plonk yourself here for two days, no trouble, or you could walk up the Mount to the summit - the number one thing to do on TripAdvisor or take yourself to The Little Big

every month or rent bikes (it's flat round these parts, so good for the whole family), or hire stand-up paddle boards at Pilot Bay, or go indoor rock climbing at The Rock House or - oh, hang on, you're on holiday, you can also do nothing!

Where to shop

The best surprise on my latest visit to Mount Maunganui was the shopping. I'm definitely not a shopaholic – I'd rather be at the beach - but the collection of shops, restaurants and cafés running two blocks of Maunganui Road near the Mount end were a revelation. I bought the bestever very pretty wraparound dress from local designer Bettie Monroe (not expensive, doesn't need ironing and looks instantly glam) and also, saints be praised, had a pleasant experience buying swimming togs in the spacy, air-conditioned surroundings of Temptations lingerie shop. If you have ever had to buy togs, you will know what a rare joy that is. Also, Blakchaos is home to the fab local shoe brand Chaos & Harmony - my sisters literally live in their sandals.

What to eat Testament to the quirky nature of the Mount is the family-run Pizza Library. You

includes a Hunger Games or Jungle Book pie. Alternatively, you can sit outside on the buzzy corner or in the bar on old cinema seats, while servers in Hawaiian shirts and bowler hats bring you cocktails (or mocktails for the kids, who love it here). If you're around on a Friday night, there's a Gourmet Food Market at Coronation Park with entertainment for the whole family, or a lovely grown-up spot is Phil's Place at the Tauranga Bridge Marina. Sensational food, lovely views and owned, but not run by, AC/DC's troubled drummer Phil Rudd.
